Base of Preference delays expected due to MilPDS upgrade

Due to issues with a recent MilPDS upgrade, members who have submitted voluntary assignment applications will experience delayed responses regarding enlisted assignment preferences ranging from Base of Preference, Joint Spouse, Follow-on, and Home-Base requests.

Currently, Air Force Personnel Center is trudging through more than 4,000 backlogged requests. These requests will be processed in priority order starting with Home-Basing and Follow-on assignments according to projected departure dates. Tentatively, AFPC estimates this backlog will be cleared by 15 June 2013; keep an eye out for any updates.

If this delay is causing a hardship, I encourage you to let me know via your chain of command. Otherwise, please exercise patience as the teams at AFPC work to resolve this issue.
